INTERNATIONAL TRANSIT STUDIES PROGRAM

Perhaps you just received a copy of the Spring 2012 International Transit Studies Program request for nominations. Was it another piece of mail that was tossed, or have you ever reviewed this TRB Transit Cooperative Research Program, which is funded by the FTA?

Admittedly, I knew little about this program; just enough to be curious, understanding that the trips included some research, amazing opportunities and networking with other transit ‘junkies’, so to speak. Almost two years ago one of these nomination letters came across my desk. I’ve nominated others for studies, however, as I’m reading it, learning of the mission, I find that it is a mission study that **I’M** really interested in! About that same time, I received a call from another transit colleague saying she would like to nominate me for this study, “Public Transportation Systems as the Foundation for Economic Growth”.

Through the nomination and selection process, this organization reviews applicants, with a desire to find a cross section of transit professionals across the United States with an interest and/or background in the particular study. It can be very competitive, yet representation from the rural sector of transit is minimal. Twelve are selected for the team, with program support staff attending as well.

I was thrilled to be chosen, along with other transit professionals from Illinois, Colorado, Mississippi, Kansas, California (four, unusual), Georgia, Utah, and Ohio. An FTA Deputy Administrator from Atlanta joined us, as well as the Senior Program Office of the TCRP program. The trips are choreographed by Kathryn Harrington-Hughes, who does an incredible job of planning, organizing and deploying the entire trip.

Our two-week mission took us to Istanbul, Turkey, Cairo, Egypt, Johannesburg, South Africa, and finally to Cape Town, South Africa. We met with transit professionals and community developers in these communities to learn of their challenges and successes in the role transit plays in the economic development of their cities. While I represented the very rural, almost frontier sector of the United States,

I could relate to the challenges each community was experiencing. Istanbul and Cairo was working with plans to move the large masses of people out of the city center, encouraging economic development in the great city areas. Johannesburg and Cape Town were working to bring the people INTO the cities, as due to apartheid and cultural difference, the people of South Africa live in very distant, remote areas, away from the cities.

This transit mission opportunity provided an experience of a lifetime. It was intense, with little down time and did require me to write a report on my assigned related topic for the compilation of the final report. The collaboration with the other team members was invaluable; the personal and professional growth it allowed me has been wonderful. I would strongly encourage you to apply if there is a mission that would interest you. Call me with any questions you may have.
