We have had luck recently hiring retired people from the local Fire Department/Police Department and Post Office.

"FUNDRAISING FOOLS"

Raising funds is synonymous with non-profit agencies and most of us in public transit can relate to. Over my time in transit, I have participated in or attended various unique fundraising events including reverse raffles, trivia events and concerts, plus the old reliable bake sales, concession stands, and selling of sports memorabilia.

Most are easy to sell to the public in more populated locations, but not so much in the rural locations. Faulk County Transit Authority opened its doors in August of 2019, just prior to the official consolidation of Community Transit of Watertown/Sisseton, Inc. Initially we provided transportation strictly within the city limits of the town of less than 800 souls. The support received by the transit project in this community has been incredible.

The local "advisory board" in Faulkton meets monthly to discuss the usual board matters. Always on the docket is the latest fundraising activity update. The advisory board consists of approximately eight regular members, but also various transit supporters who attend when schedules will allow. Filling the back room at Dot T's steakhouse on meeting night is not all that unique. Co-Executive Directors Kathy Holman and Terry Hoffman attend as many of the meetings as possible and have participated in a few of the fund-raising events. They respectfully refer to the group as "fundraising fools".

"Pancake feeds, raffles, special events and an annual donation plea to area businesses, organizations and individuals keeps our small but passionate board busy throughout the year," said Advisory board member Linda Batholomew. "We are constantly looking for other areas to explore. We cannot let the ideas become stale."

Faulkton does not have any cafes or restaurants that serve breakfast, so during the season, local hunters often look for food in the mornings. Faulk County Transit heeded the call and spent a morning cooking and visiting with all the locals who came to eat. Lead driver, Teresa Bartholomew, used her public relation skills to work the crowd

promoting transit. Bartholomew's efforts brought in additional donations from the visitors.

Supporters like Bartholomew believe Faulk County Transit is more than just a means of transportation. They believe it's a service that has made life easier for working families, a service to help the elderly and homebound with their everyday needs and a service that embodies a caring community.

"It has provided access to employment, education, healthcare and cultural events that enrich our lives," said Bartholomew. "Transit has become an essential service to the area that has helped to not only improve, but sustain the quality of life we all deserve."

"The community has latched on to the service and they work hard to raise the needed funds," said Holman. "Their enthusiasm is inspiring."
